

3 Nephi 29: 1-4*Covenants*

1 Mormon concluded his description of this majestic season [the visit of the Savior among the Nephites]... by testifying that when a record of [Jesus Christ's] visit would come to the Gentiles (in the form of the Book of Mormon), then all might know that the covenant and promises to Israel of the last days were 'already beginning to be fulfilled'...

God's covenant will be kept with all of his covenant people. No one will be able to "turn the right hand of the Lord unto the left" on this matter. And the call to the Gentiles, for which Christ's visit to the Nephites published in the Book of Mormon is the ultimate latter-day declaration, is for them to claim the same covenant and promises.
